# The Baptism of the Lord

Is 42:1-4, 6-7 | Acts 10:34-38 | Lk 3:15-16, 21-22

# GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE In many renditions of the Baptism of Jesus, artists connect the scene at the Jordan River with Jesus' death. A withered tree, for example, reminds us of the cross, or a mountain points to Mount Calvary. These connections show a real relationship between Jesus' baptism and his passion: his baptism marks the acceptance and beginning of his mission, which would ultimately lead to his crucifixion. For us, too, baptism is a decisive moment which destines us for - you guessed it death! Not physical death (which will happen regardless), but a death to everything that is not of God. By making us part of God's family as his adopted children, our baptism summons us to "die" to our old life of sin and take on new life in Christ. This means turning away each day from sin so we can become increasingly fit to spend eternity with God. Like Jesus who rose both from the baptismal waters and from the tomb, we are meant, by our daily efforts to be faithful - to "rise" with

him in the new life he won for us.

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT After Jesus is baptized, two important events occur immediately: the Holy Spirit descends upon him while God the Father proclaims his delight in his Son: "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased." Here we see the profound meaning of our own baptism and its effects. In addition to cleansing us from the stain of original sin, baptism: 1) gives us the gift of the Holy Spirit; and 2) welcomes us into God's family as his adopted children. Armed with the Holy Spirit and the assurance of God's fatherly care, we are equipped to engage in the daily struggle of dying-and-rising in Christ. We can always call on the Holy Spirit for strength when we face temptations or difficult decisions. Likewise, when we are discouraged or we confront our own weaknesses, we can look to the Father for help. Recall the words which the Father spoke to Jesus, and which he says to us in our baptism (and he doesn't take them back!): You are my beloved son. You are my


#### Tell It Like It Is

## Fr. Reynaldo Pineda Sarmiento

It is with deep sadness and hope in the resurrection that the Diocese of San Jose announces the passing of Fr.
Reynaldo Sarmiento, who returned to the Lord on Tuesday, Jan. 7, 2025, after a courageous sevenmenth battle with pancreatic cancer. He passed away peacefully, surrounded by his loving sisters and priest friends.

Fr. Reynaldo was born on Oct. 4, 1967, in Manila, Philippines. He was the youngest of five children and the only son of his late parents, Conrado (+Nov. 6, 2016) and Encarnacion (+Oct. 1, 2024).

Before embracing his vocation to the priesthood, Fr. Reynaldo had a successful career in the hospitality industry. He worked as manager in esteemed establishments such as Dusit Thani Hotel, Shangri-La Hotel, Mandarin Oriental Hotel, and TGIF Restaurant in Manila. His professional path included training in Hong Kong and Texas, preparing him for his leadership roles. Known for his radiant smile, exceptional singing voice, and passion for service, Fr. Reynaldo was admired for his dedication and warmth.

Fr. Reynaldo's family and friends remember him for his charismatic personality, generosity, and profound gratitude. A man of deep compassion, he had a special place in his heart for the homeless, often going out of his way to feed those in need.

Even before entering the seminary, Fr. Reynaldo displayed his devotion to God through his prayer life, regular Mass attendance, and service as a choir soloist at Saint Elizabeth Parish in Milpitas. His vocational journey led him to join the Carmelite Order in San Jose before discerning diocesan priesthood. He later entered St. Patrick Seminary in Menlo Park and was ordained a priest on June 7, 2014.

During his 10 years of ministry, Fr. Reynaldo faithfully served the Diocese with joy, dedication, and a servant's heart. His kindness, humility, and unwavering faith touched the lives of many parishioners, friends, and colleagues. He was parochial vicar at Queen of Apostles Church in San Jose, Church of the Ascension in Saratoga (2019-23) and St. Frances Cabrini Church, San Jose. He was pastor of St. Francis of Assisi Church in San Jose.

He is survived by his beloved sisters: Sailani Morales (Edgardo+), Estelita De Guzman (Eric), Ruth Perez (Jake), and Flordeliza Consolacion (Boyet), as well as many nieces, nephews, and countless parishioners who were blessed by his ministry and friendship.

May he rest in peace.
